Depth of learning through Charanga Musical School

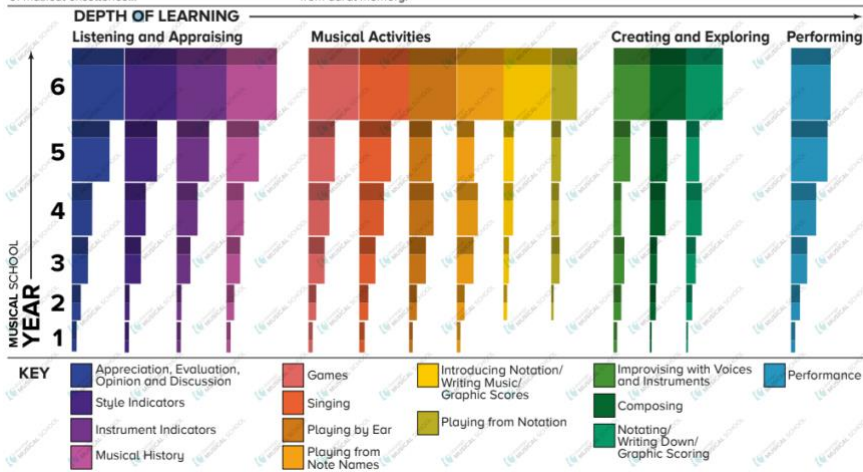


National Curriculum 2014:

"...learn to sing and to use their voices, to create and compose music on their own and with others, have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, use technology appropriately and have the opportunity to progress to the next level of musical excellence..."

"Pupils should be taught to sing and play musically with increasing confidence and control. They should develop an understanding of musical composition, organising and manipulating ideas within musical structures and reproducing sounds from aural memory..."

"Pupils should be taught to play and perform in solo and ensemble contexts, using their voices and playing musical instruments with increasing accuracy, fluency, control and expression."



The Interrelated Dimensions of Music

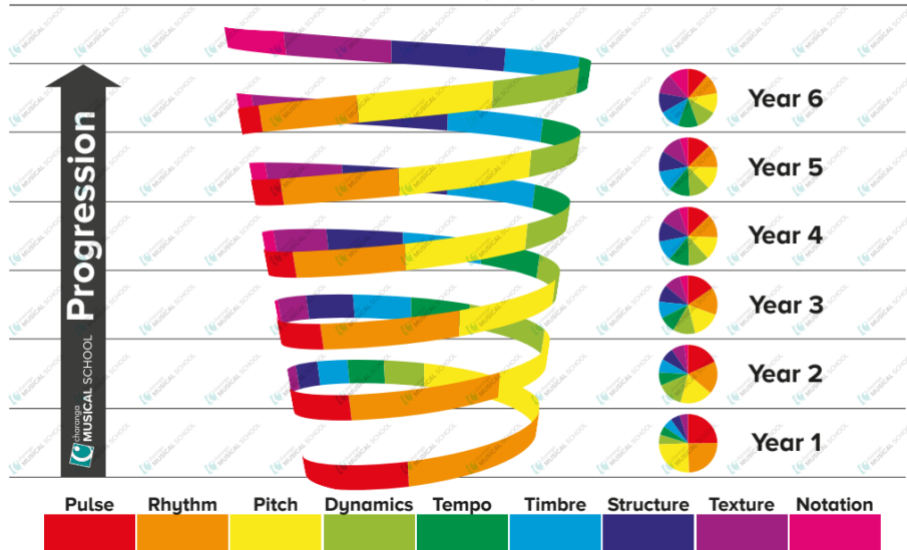
Progression through Charanga Musical School



Progression throughout the Units of Work reinforces the interrelated dimensions of music.

With each new song, always start again with the foundation of pulse, then rhythm, then pitch, adding new dimensions as you progress.

This represents an ever increasing spiral of musical learning.



The opportunities pupils have to learn to sing or play an instrument during lesson time, such as through whole-class ensemble teaching in some or all year groups.

- Use of percussion in KS1 through 'Little Fingers Programme' and in EYFS provision.
- Use of glockenspiels and recorders in KS2.
- Weekly percussion lessons (2 half terms per year) lead by Durham Music Service.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Music tuition:

Small group lessons, lead by Durham Music Service: Drum and Violin. 30 mins per week. This tuition has a charge to parents or carers, and PP students can receive subsidised/free lessons.

Choir – Lead by C.Richards – 30 mins per week.

Singing assemblies – Lead by A.Donnely, C. Richards and N.Smith. 30 mins per week.

Performing Arts club – Lead by A.Donnely (school performance practise)

Instrument loans:

Children who receive private small group violin lessons are able to loan a violin for the duration of their violin lessons.

After school provision:

- Performing Arts Club (see above)
- Dance club

- Singing club
- Dance within after school provision.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Musical experiences:

- Singing in assembly (weekly)
- Musical performance – (Annie – April 2025)
- Choir performances in assembly (termly)
- Performance by Durham Music Service (yearly)
- Opportunities within year groups to watch a show outside of school

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- Have more intake for private/small group drum/violin lessons – through demos and advertising.
- Successfully run a performing arts club in order to perform first musical performance.
- All staff to become more familiar with new music scheme (Charanga).
- More time spent in lessons playing Glockenspiels and percussion instruments.
- Organise more trips to shows/plays/concerts.
